



2007 d'ARENBERG THE MONEY SPIDER ROUSSANNE

WINEMAKER:	Chester Osborn
REGION:	McLaren Vale, South Australia
VARIETALS:	Roussanne
MATURATION:	A small portion was aged in French oak barriques
ALCOHOL:	13.5% alc/vol

THE ART OF BEING DIFFERENT:

d'Arenberg's first small crop of Roussanne was harvested and held in a shed for an hour while the crusher was being prepared. Meanwhile, a sea of tiny "Money Spiders" crawled to the top of the load and started furiously spinning a cover of webs. The spiders were carefully removed, as much as possible, since they are considered good luck charms. In fact, a popular belief is that if you treat these small spiders with respect, wealth will come your way.

WINEMAKING:

Picked at a slightly higher Beaume to enhance the stone fruit characters, the fermentation period was long and moderately cool to retain fruit characters. Only free-run juice was used for the final wine and no induced malolactic fermentation was undertaken.

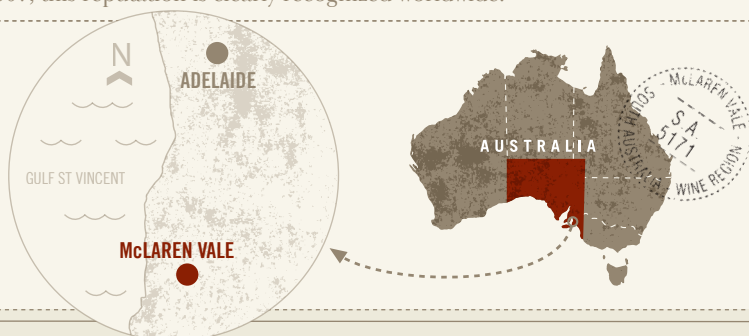
TASTING NOTES:

The Money Spider Roussanne has a brilliant mid-straw appearance with a lifted, aromatic nose of dried herbs, citrus and cut grass. As the wine opens up, floral and spiced fruit notes mix with melon, nectarine, green tea and ripe apple characters. The youthful, bold palate is nicely balanced with plenty of ripe fruit characters. The finish is dry with lingering mineral and honeysuckle notes balanced by fine acidity.
